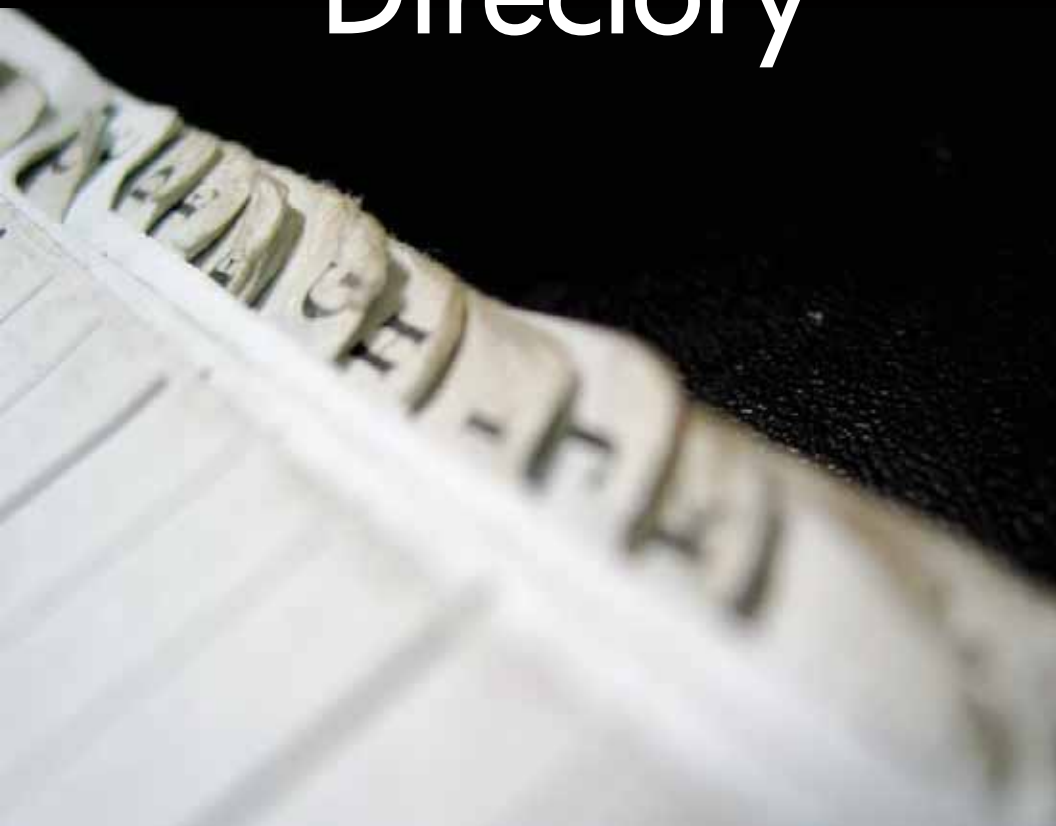

History of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists

In August of 1953, the initial letters for organization of a college or association of pathologists in the osteopathic profession were sent out to all the practicing pathologists in osteopathic institutions know to the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology.

The call for an organizational meeting was issued for July 12, 1954 at 9:00am in the Blue Room of the King Edward Hotel in Toronto, Canada. Members present at this first meeting were Drs. Dominic Ambrosecchia, Norman W. Arends, Otterbein Dressler, George E. Himes, William J. Loos, Waldo B. Miller, O Edwin Owen, George Robinson and Arthur L. Wickens.

The constitution and bylaws were adopted at this session under the name of the American Osteopathic Association of Pathologists.

It was unanimously agreed at this meeting that those eligible for membership in the association who signed the petition for affiliation with the American Osteopathic Association would become charter members.

On July 14, 1955, the first annual seminar of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists (the name being changed during the year by mutual consent of the membership to conform with AOA regulations) under the chairmanship of the late Robert P. Morhardt, DO was held in Los Angeles, CA.

The election of the first Board of Governors was at this time. Those elected were President George E. Himes, Vice President Basil K. Woods, President-Elect W. Harriet Davis and Secretary-Treasurer Arthur L. Wickens.

Members of the Board of Governors, Ruth E. Waddel, A. W. Mazerski and George E. Miller. Dr. Loos moved that the meetings be held during the AOA conventions. In 1956, the minutes stated that the Secretary was instructed to write the AOA Board of Trustees “that all registered osteopathic hospitals be required to use osteopathic pathologists.”

1958 recorded the first discussion about the creation of Fellowships by the College - the title of Fellow to members deserving such honor, pending incorporation.

In 1959, the Board was enlarged from seven to nine members. The dues were increased from \$25.00 to \$50.00. A memorial prize was established for a winning paper presented by a resident. In that same year, Otterbein Dressler gave the A.T. Still Memorial Lecture at the AOA.

After several attempts at incorporation of the College in the State of Michigan, with consideration of several other states including Missouri, the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists was incorporated in the State of Illinois. Charles F. Carpentier, Secretary of State, granted the charter on October 27, 1960.

As stated in the Charter, “The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

1. To seek to improve the practice of pathology.
2. To encourage the application of Osteopathic concepts in the field of Pathology.
3. To study and promote such other arts and sciences as may directly or indirectly improve the practice of Pathology.
4. To increase knowledge of the practice of pathology of such osteopathic physicians as are considered qualified.
5. To maintain and promote the highest moral and ethical standards in the practice of Pathology.”

Officially named in the Articles of Incorporation as the first Board of Governors were Drs. Norman W. Arends, Francis S. Buck, Arthur L. Wickens, George E. Himes, Ruth E. Waddel, W. Harriet Davis, A.E. Nichols, William L. Silverman, and Miguel M. Alvarado.

In that same year, mention was made to contact the AOA so that the College would be represented on the AOA Committee of Hospitals. It was also noted that the initials AOCF were being used by the College of Proctologists, therefore, the College became known as the AOCFth.

A Pathologists' Placement Bureau was established. A motion was passed that "at least one paper was required for residents in training programs", and approval was received from the Board to print a directory which would include the past presidents, constitution and bylaws, past meetings, possible history, officers, etc., in addition to member information.

The College did not have a gavel for its meeting, however, it was noted in the minutes that, "because we are such an orderly group, no gavel is necessary."

Posthumous Fellowships were awarded in 1961 to Drs. William J. Loos, Robert P. Morhardt, Donald Roach, and Basil K. Woods. Fellowship was also awarded to Otterbein Dressler, and it was recommended that a key be given in addition to the certificate of Fellowship.

A discussion regarding a registry of Pathology relative to study sets of slides was first noted in 1961. In that same year, submitted to the Board and to the AOA were proposed constitution and bylaws, for a new society, the Osteopathic Cytology Society.

In 1962, the Osteopathic Cytology Society was approved by the AOA and had affiliate status with the AOCFth.

This was also the time of the “rift” in California. The College passed a resolution that “we encourage the efforts of our California colleagues to be reinstated with full privileges.”

In 1965, it was first suggested that midyear meetings be held. This was instituted the next Spring with a meeting held in Detroit, MI, April 1966.

In 1968, a committee was formed to establish a Founders Memorial Lecture. This would be an award given to a resident for an outstanding paper. A grant was received toward funding, and it was decided that \$250 would be given for the first place winner, \$100 for second place, and \$50 for third place, with the stipulation that the money must be used to attend the Annual Seminar and present the paper.

The first awards were given in 1971 for first, second and third places to Drs. Edward M. Cohen, Louis Lang III, and Charles L. Woods.

Also in 1971, a resolution was sent to the AOA “that we institute a straight pathology internship in lieu of a rotating internship, which would then replace the first year of residency training.”

In 1973, the bylaws and constitution were approved for the establishment of an Auxiliary to the AOCP. In that same year, dues were increased to \$150 (the first increase since 1955) and the “th” was also dropped from the AOCP(th).

The Board of Pathology successfully completed arrangements for a certifying examination in Forensic Pathology and one physician was certified. Also, the AOA notified the College that a conjoined board, the American Osteopathic Board of Nuclear Medicine was established, composed of pathologists, internists, and radiologists.

1974 was an active year. There was considerable discussion on the AOCPP position relative to DOs that took MD training programs and then working in osteopathic hospitals. It was determined that no course of action was possible at this time.

A resolution was passed regarding the slide seminar. It stated that each member must submit at least one case per year of wet tissue, slides, etc. A charge of \$50 per slide set would be charged to those not supplying a case for study.

The Board stated that since no constitution and bylaws had been submitted to the AOA for approval, the Ladies Auxiliary was not an official auxiliary. Also, since the Osteopathic Cytology Society had been inactive for many years, the Board recommended that it be dissolved.

Finally, the AOCPP left the AOA to have its annual meeting with the Annual Clinical Association of the Osteopathic Surgeons (ACAOS) at the Americana Hotel in Bal Harbour, FL

Three major events took place in 1975. The Clearinghouse was officially established with a protocol to be developed; the College was to officially recognize a Pathologist of the year, and Otterbein Dressler was named as the Osteopathic Pathologist of the Year. The College again met with the ACAOS, this year at the Holden Hotel in Washington, DC.

In 1976, a motion was passed to approve a "straight internship in Pathology." This was submitted to the AOA for approval. The College also met with the ACAOS at the Fairmont Hotel in New Orleans, LA.

In 1977, the AOA contacted the College stating that "straight internship in Pathology is not appropriate at the present time."

In this same year, there was discussion that the Academy of Professors of Pathology be recognized as an affiliate of the College. This was passed subject to compilation of a manual identifying the purpose of this academy and submitting it to the Board of Governors for approval.

The AOCPP decided that it would not meet with the ACAOS and returned to meeting with the AOA during the Convention.

In November 1978, CLIA (clinical laboratory guidelines) became effective, mandating proficiency testing, quality assurance programs, stringent standards, and monitoring by the Center for Disease Control through the AOA.

The College was asked by the AOA to participate and direct a program of laboratory inspections and develop a document for surveys. The College formed a standing committee, Inspections and Laboratory Accreditation.

In October 1979, there was a positive federal action. It was announced to the membership that President Jimmy Carter signed into law an osteopathic Certificate of Need.

This elation was short lived, however, when in 1980 the College was informed by the AOA that the AOA had lost its "deemed status" as an accrediting body - a situation that remained in limbo for nearly two years. However, the AOCPP remained as AOA inspectors for the laboratories as a part of the hospital accreditation inspection team.

One of the major causes for concern in 1981 was the decreased number of residents in training programs. The consensus of the Board was that it was because of the 1+ 4 years, internship plus residency training. Eight hospitals were listed as not having had residents in over three years.

There was a steady decline in attendance at the annual meeting and the College opted to return to the ACAOS meeting in Boston, MA

In 1982, the main topic at Board and College meetings was the number of osteopathic physicians taking MD training programs.

The College met with the ACAOS in San Francisco, CA.

In 1983, inflation was taking its toll and the College raised its dues for the second time. The federal government was getting more and more involved in medical care. In a report to the Board, a prediction was made that Medicare would be bankrupt in three to five years; that government and hospitals would dictate to physicians; that the quality of healthcare would decrease; and that DRG's would extend to all services.

Motions were passed regarding the two AOCF awards. The memorial lecture was to be known as the Otterbein Dressler Memorial Address, and the Pathologist of the Year award was to be called the Distinguished Service Award.

Although the College met with the ACAOS in Toronto, CAN, they decided that it would not meet with them any longer, returning to the AOA Convention.

The AOCF returned to meeting with the AOA during the 1984 Convention in Las Vegas, NV

In 1986, the Bylaws Committee submitted new bylaws providing for Active Membership for DOs having taken allopathic training. This was presented to the AOA Board of Trustees but disapproved.

The AOA announced that it had formed a “Task Force to Explore Alternative Approval Mechanism for Postdoctoral Training” to further study this situation.

In 1987, the (AOA) Task force to Explore Alternative Approval Mechanism for Postdoctoral Training began its meetings. The Task Force was to have a final report for the AOA Annual Board of Trustees/House of Delegates meeting in July 1988.

Other new action by the AOA was the trial program of MD internships, which would be in effect until 1989.

Another federal program was established, called, “Title IV, Practitioner Adverse Credentialing - Data Bank.” This was to go into effect as soon as a contract was awarded to devise the database. Among other things, in the case of a new physician asking for privileges, it would require hospitals to check the individual physician database prior to granting privileges. It would also require a review of this database for all physicians each time privileges were renewed. Any malpractice suits, litigation, adverse action, etc., was to be made a part of the physician’s file.

At the 1988 meeting, the College first reviewed a bylaws change which would be presented to the membership for action in 1989. This was necessary to conform with the new AOA guidelines and revision of the active membership category - a result of the Task Force.

A Relative Value Scale (RVS) for Pathology Services was mandated by the federal government with a report by Health & Human Services to Congress on April 1, 1989.

July 1989 was the date set by the AOA as the cut-off date for physicians who completed allopathic training to apply for program approval for those programs not previously recognized as AOA-approved. One specific requirement was

there had to be a rotating AOA-approved internship to be considered eligible.

By virtue of the bylaw change and at the 1989 annual meeting, the College recommended approval for its active members to fall under these new Task Force guidelines.

The American Osteopathic Association at its midyear 1990 Board meeting passed a resolution to allow each specialty college a seat in the AOA House of Delegates, "They shall have voice without vote."

In 1991 the membership at its Annual Meeting, renamed the Slide Seminar, "Morris R. Osattin Memorial Slide Seminar". Dr. Osattin was responsible for producing the slide boxes for the membership and presenting the accompanying seminar each year.

The American Osteopathic Association at its Annual meeting in 1992 granted voice with vote to specialty colleges seated in the AOA House of Delegates.

In 1993, following the AOA '92 resolution granting specialty colleges a right to vote at the AOA House of Delegates, President Arthur P. Pancioli appointed Dr. Lillian Hynes-Longendorfer as the first representative to this new position.

At its Annual Meeting in October 1995, the general membership approved a revision to the Bylaws, Rules and Regulations. Major changes included new rules and categories for the designation of the title of "Fellow" and new categories of membership.

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Article I

NAME

The organization shall be known and incorporated as the
American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, Incorporated.

Article II

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this college shall be:

1. To maintain the highest moral and ethical standards in education, research, and training in the practice of pathology.
2. To develop and promote the application of the osteopathic concept in the field of pathology.
3. To evaluate, determine and establish methods, requirements and procedures in the education of osteopathic physicians in the field of pathology.
4. To insure that all programs conducted under the auspices of this organization are in accord with the adopted policies of the American Osteopathic Association.
5. To study and promote such other arts and sciences as will improve the practice of pathology.

Article III

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 - CATEGORIES

- A. Active
- B. Candidate
- C. Associate

- D. Emeritus
- E. Junior
- F. Affiliate
- G. Retired

Section 2 – QUALIFICATIONS

A. Acceptance for Active, Candidate or Associate members requires the individual physician to be:

1. a graduate of a college of osteopathic medicine or college of medicine acceptable to the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) and the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, Inc. (AOCP)

2. participating in or have completed a training program acceptable to this college and the AOA.

3. recommended by two physicians.

4. elected by a simple majority of the Board of Governors, subject to approval by the Active members present at the next annual meeting of the college.

Section 3 – CATEGORIES

A. Active Member

1. Active membership in the AOCP shall be available to physicians who have qualified for such membership as set forth in these bylaws.

2. He/she shall have the right to vote and hold committee appointments.

B. Candidate member

1. A physician of good moral character shall be eligible for this category if he has been accepted into a formal training program approved by the AOA and by this college.

2. Candidates shall not vote or hold office, but may be appointed to committees.

3. A candidate member will advance to Active member without further application upon completion of his/her training program.

C. Associate Member

1. A physician or health professional not otherwise qualified for membership may be recommended for this category.

2. An active member shall nominate the person and submit the necessary documents to the college for presentation to the Board of Governors.

3. Associate members shall not vote or hold office.

D. Emeritus Member

1. Emeritus membership may be granted by the Board of Governors to any member of the college who has reached the age of 65, is no longer in active practice, and has been a member in good standing for fifteen (15) consecutive years immediately preceding the request. (The Board of Governors may waive the requirement on individual consideration.)

2. Written petition to the Board of Governors is required.

3. Emeritus members shall have voice in the affairs of the college without vote.

4. Emeritus membership may also be granted at any age by the Board of Governors upon application from a member of the college who has become permanently disabled.

5. Emeritus members shall not be required to pay dues or assessments.

E. Junior member

1. An individual of good moral character shall be eligible for this category if he/she is enrolled in a

college of medicine or in an internship program approved by the AOA and this college.

2. An application shall include a recommendation from a professor, dean or medical director.

3. Junior members shall not vote, hold office or be appointed to committees.

4. Junior members shall not be required to pay dues or assessments.

5. A junior member will advance to candidate member without further application, upon notification of acceptance into a residency program acceptable to the AOA and this college.

F. Affiliate member

1. An individual of good moral character shall be eligible for this category if he/she is an allied laboratory professional (MT, MLT, HT, cytotechnologists.)

2. An application shall include a recommendation from the department chair or an AOCP active member.

3. Affiliate members shall not vote nor hold office but can serve on appointed committees.

G. Retired member

1. An individual of good moral character shall be eligible for this category if he/she is currently retired from practice.

2. Retired members may vote, hold office, serve on committees and pay dues as set by the Board of Governors.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE

The officers of the college shall be the president, president-elect, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and immediate past-president.

Section 2. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The Board of Governors will elect the following officers of the college at the annual meeting from within the Board: president, president-elect, vice president and the secretary-treasurer.

A. On the last day of the annual meeting the president-elect shall automatically become president, the president shall automatically become immediate past-president, the vice-president shall automatically become president elect, and the secretary treasurer shall automatically become vice president of the college.

B. Should an office become vacant, the Board of Governors may appoint an interim governor until the next regular meeting.

Section 3. DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. President

1. The president shall function as the principal executive officer of the college, member of all committees and as chairman of the Board of Governors with the right to vote.

2. He/she shall preside at all meetings of the college.

B. President-Elect

1. The president-elect shall be a member of the Board of Governors with a right to vote, shall preside at the meetings in the absence the president.

2. In the event of the death or resignation of the president shall succeed him/her in office.

C. Vice President

1. The vice-president shall be a member of the Board of Governors with the right to vote.

2. In the event of the death or resignation of the president-elect, shall succeed him in office.

3. The vice-president shall serve as consultant to the secretary-treasurer for one (1) year or as deemed necessary by the board.

D. Secretary-Treasurer

1. The secretary-treasurer shall be a member of the Board of Governors with a right to vote.

2. He/she shall be responsible for the handling of all of the funds of the college, shall furnish a surety bond if specified by the Board of Governors. Periodic reports of the financial condition of the college shall be submitted to the Board of Governors. He/she shall assist in preparing an annual budget and recommended policies for efficient use of college funds for approval by the Board of Governors.

E. Immediate Past-President

1. The immediate past-president shall be a member of the Board of Governors with a right to vote.

Article V

BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLLEGE

Section 1.

The Board of Governors shall consist of nine (9) board-certified members.

Section 2.

Each governor shall serve a term of three (3) years and shall take office immediately following the annual meeting at which he/she is elected.

Section 3.

Governors shall be elected by members of the college as

prescribed under Article VII, Section I of the Bylaws.

Section 4.

At least two (2) governors shall be elected at each Annual Meeting.

Section 5.

Vacancies occurring interim shall be filled by the Board of Governors until the next annual meeting of the college, when proper action shall be taken.

Section 6. Functions of the Board of Governors

A. The Board of Governors shall manage and direct all affairs of the college in a manner to accomplish the objectives of the college. They:

1. shall establish and initiate fees for the annual dues in all applicable categories of the membership.

2. shall elect the college officers annually from within the Board of Governors.

3. shall create and appoint from presidential nominees all standing, ad hoc and special committees.

4. shall direct and review all committee activities.

5. shall call annual and special meetings of the college as may be required to conduct all other college affairs otherwise not provided.

6. shall exercise legal and constitutional authority and responsibility in directing the affairs of the college including the initiation and establishment of policy in order to promote and maintain the objectives of the college.

7. shall review the complaints and grievances affecting members or residents in training programs approved by the college.

8. shall report to the college annually as to work and activities, including an audited financial statement prepared by an accountant, and such interim financial reports as necessary.

9. may be called into session by the president, or in his absence, the president-elect, upon petition by any three (3) governors.

Article VI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the college shall consist of the president, president-elect, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and immediate past-president. A quorum consists of three (3) members.

Article VII ELECTIONS OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS AND OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE.

Section 1. BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLLEGE
The president shall appoint a nominating committee of three (3) active, certified members at the onset of the annual meeting. This committee is to include a governor of the AACP, a member of the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology who is not a governor of the college, and a member of the college at large who is neither a member of the Board of Governors nor of the Board of Pathology. This nominating committee shall bring in a slate of nominees. Preceding the vote, nominations from the floor shall be entertained by the president of the College. Voting shall be by secret ballot with the highest number of votes needed for election.

Section 2. OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE
The officers of the college shall be elected by the Board of Governors, from within this Board.

Article VIII
MEETINGS

The Board of Governors shall call at least one (1) meeting of the membership annually, at a site and time it shall determine.

Article IX
PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

Meetings of the Board of Governors, of the Executive Committee, and of the college shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

Article X
ETHICS

The American Osteopathic College of Pathologists subscribes to and abides by the Code of Ethics of the AOA, and requires adherence to this Code by its members.

Article XI
DUES

Section 1.

The dues for each category of membership shall be fixed by the Board of Governors at the annual meeting. Life and junior members shall pay no dues. The fiscal year will be concurrent with the calendar year.

Article XII
AMERICAN OSTEOPATHIC BOARD OF PATHOLOGY

Section 1.

The American Osteopathic Board of Pathology shall function by its own bylaws in every way other than in the election of its members.

Section 2.

Nomination to the Board of Pathology shall be by college members who are fully certified. Members of the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology must be fully certified by the

AOA upon recommendation by the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology.

Section 3.

A nominating committee shall be chosen by the president of the AOCPC. This committee is to include a governor of the AOCPC, a member of the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology who is not a governor of the college, and one additional member of the college. The committee is to be selected at the commencement of the annual meeting.

The committee shall be given a list of the members eligible for the position or positions available. A slate from the nominating committee shall be presented during the meetings to the certified college membership. Preceding the vote, nominations from the floor shall be entertained by the president of the college. Voting shall be by secret ballot with the highest number of votes needed for election.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

The bylaws may be amended by the active members. A proposed amendment must be communicated to the voting membership in writing at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting of the college. Recommendations by the Board of Governors relative to a proposed amendment must be communicated to the voting membership prior to the annual meeting. For passage, an amendment must receive an affirmative vote by two-thirds of the active members present for voting.

Article XIV DISSOLUTION OF THE CORPORATION

In the event that the AOCPC shall ever cease to exist, it is hereby resolved that all minutes, books, pertinent documents, and monies shall be donated to the AOA.

RULES AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
AMERICAN OSTEOPATHIC COLLEGE OF PATHOLOGISTS,
INC.

Article I
CONDUCT OF COLLEGE BUSINESS

Section 1. MEETINGS OF THE MEMBERS

A. Time and Place

1. Meetings of active members shall be held in conjunction with the annual seminar. Other member meetings shall be held at such times and places as directed by the Board of Governors. A quorum shall be 25% of the voting members of the college.

B. Suspension of Rules

1. The rules may be suspended at any meeting by unanimous consent of the members present and eligible to vote.

C. Notification of Regular Meetings

1. Members shall be notified at least thirty (30) days prior to the scheduled meeting.

Section 2. MEETINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. A meeting of the Executive Committee may be called by the president or any three (3) members of the Executive Committee as needed.

B. All action taken by the Executive Committee shall be acted upon by the Board of Governors at their next meeting.

1. This committee shall consist of the president, president-elect, incoming vice president, secretary-treasurer as chairman, and immediate past-president.

2. They shall review all matters of a financial nature involving the utilization and expenditures of the college funds.

Section 3. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

A. All college members are welcome at meetings of the Board of Governors. They shall have voice but no vote.

Article II COMMITTEES

Appointments to committees shall be annual and terminate at the next annual meeting. The president shall appoint the committees subject to the approval of the Board of Governors. Each committee will report in writing their prior activities to the annual meeting and/or at such time as requested by the Board of Governors.

Section 1. STANDING COMMITTEES

A. Membership and Public Relations Committee

1. There shall be three (3) members of this committee.
2. The executive director shall forward the necessary credentials of all applicants to the chairman of this committee.
3. The committee shall evaluate and review the documents and return them to the chairman with their recommendation.
4. The names of the prospective members may be published in the college newsletter.
5. Each member shall contact residents in training and strive to have all trainees apply for membership.

B. Program Committee

1. The program chairman for the next annual scientific seminar shall be assigned to the newest member of the Board of Governors.

2. Chairpersons for programs other than the annual scientific seminar shall be appointed as needed.

C. Rules and Regulations Committee

1. This committee shall consist of three (3) members.
2. This committee shall study, review and recommend revisions to the bylaws of the college as needed.

D. Editorial Committee

1. This committee shall cooperate with the editorial department of the AOA and assist in editing scientific articles pertinent to this specialty.

2. The committee shall consist of three (3) members.

E. Resolutions Committee

1. This committee shall consist of three (3) members.
2. This committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing suitable resolutions, as directed by the president and the Board of Governors.

F. Evaluating Committee

1. This committee shall be composed of the president and secretary of the AOCP, chairman and secretary of the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology, college representative to the Council on Postdoctoral Training, and a certified member at large to be appointed by the president of the college.

2. The purpose of this committee shall be for evaluating all program documents, training documents and credentials for candidates in AOA-approved training, submitting its recommendations to the Council on Postdoctoral Training. The secretary of the college shall serve as chairman.

G. National Laboratory Standards and Inspections

1. The committee shall consist of five members, with at least one member who actively participates on the AOA survey team.

2. The purpose of this committee shall be to:

A) evaluate current and proposed laboratory guidelines.

B) serve as, or recommend consultants in all areas of laboratory management.

Section 2. Ad Hoc and Special Committees

These committees shall be appointed by the president as the need arises.

Article III RECOGNITION

The AOCPC acknowledges three separate categories of recognition.

Section 1 - Title of Fellow

A. The title "fellow" may be conferred upon any pathologist who is board certified by the AOA through the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology or by the American Board of Pathology, in

1) both anatomic pathology and laboratory medicine, having successfully completed both parts of the certifying examination.

2) anatomic pathology or laboratory medicine, following a three-year program and/or subspecialty program, having successfully completed that specific certifying examination.

B. Eligibility is effective upon notification from either board, of successful completion of all applicable parts of their respective examinations. The time limit for eligibility is without restriction, once eligibility has been established.

C. Every application for fellow requires a cover letter, documentation of successful completion of the examination(s) from the certifying board, and letters of endorsement from two board certified pathologists who recognize the professional abilities and character of the applicant. An application fee established by the board shall accompany the request.

D. Conferring of the title, "fellow" shall occur at either the annual or midyear dinner meeting.

Section 2 - Title of Distinguished Fellow

A. The title "distinguished fellow" may be conferred upon any board certified member of the college who has rendered service to the college and/or profession as to warrant special recognition.

B. The final appointment for distinguished fellow may be selected by either the Board of Governors or through nomination from any active member of the college, presenting in writing, the nominee's special qualifications.

C. Conferring of the title, "distinguished fellow" shall occur at the annual dinner meeting.

Section 3 - Title of Honorary Fellow

A. At the discretion of the Board of Governors, the title, "honorary fellow" may be conferred on any individual, other than a member of the college who has made a significant contribution to the college and/or medical profession.

B. Conferring of the title, "honorary fellow" shall occur at either the annual or midyear dinner meeting.

Article IV. DISCIPLINE

Each member is required to attend two (2) meetings of the college every six (6) years to maintain membership in the college. Special exception will be given on an individual basis.

Section 1 - Non-Payment of Dues

A. A member who fails to pay yearly dues within ninety (90) days after January 1 shall be considered delinquent. Thirty (30) days after written notification, thereof, the member shall be dropped from the rolls of the college and deprived of all rights and privileges. Reinstatement shall be accomplished by paying the back dues in full. Special cases may be appealed to the Board of Governors.

Section 2 - Mechanism for Disciplinary Action

A. The Board of Governors may expel, suspend or otherwise discipline any member found to be deficient in moral character, professional competence, or found guilty of professional misconduct. Such questions shall be referred to the president by the aggrieved party. In each case, the Board of Governors or any committee made up of governors, shall evaluate the matter and submit its findings and recommendations in writing to the Board as a whole.

B. If the evidence before the Board of Governors is sufficient to consider disciplinary action, the Board is obliged to notify the member by certified mail at least fifteen (15) days in advance of the next meeting so the member may appear before it to submit such oral or written testimony as the member deems proper.

C. Disciplinary action against any member shall require an affirmative vote of $\frac{2}{3}$ of the members of the Board of Governors present at the meeting at which such action is considered. Any member whose membership has been terminated or suspended shall forfeit all rights and privileges of the college and shall not thereafter hold himself or herself to be a member of the AOCP.

Section 3 - Appeals

The Board of Governors shall hear appeals of any denial of membership or other action by officers of the college affecting membership status or other rights of a members.

A. In any case when membership is denied an applicant, the secretary-treasurer shall give the applicant written notice of

said action within fifteen (15) days of such action.

B. Within ten (10) days after receiving said notice, the appellant shall have the right to appeal by giving written notice to the secretary-treasurer of his desire to appeal. Other appeals may be initiated by the appellant giving such notice at any time.

C. Within fifteen (15) days after receipt of said notice by the secretary-treasurer, the Board of Governors shall set a date and place for a hearing and give the appellant notice of same. The appellant may appear at the appeal hearing in person, and shall have the right to be represented by counsel and submit and adduce additional evidence. After considering the testimony, evidence and/or additional evidence, the Board of Governors may sustain, reverse or modify the original decision. All evidence and findings at said appeal hearings shall be transcribed.

D. As soon as practicable after said hearing, the secretary-treasurer shall notify the applicant in writing of the Board of Governors' final decision.

Article V PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENTS

Section 1 - Parliamentarian

The president shall appoint a knowledgeable active member as parliamentarian for the college. This appointment shall be annual.

Section 2 - Sergeant-at-Arms

The president shall recommend a Sergeant-at-Arms for the college. This appointment shall be annual.

Section 3 - Representatives to the American Osteopathic Association

The president shall appoint representatives to the AOA committees affecting this specialty. The appointment will run consistent with the terms set for it by the AOA.

Section 4 - Other Appointments

The president shall appoint representatives to those agencies, associations or organizations affecting this specialty as necessary.

Article VI

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Section 1 - SEVERABILITY

If any provision of the bylaws or rules and regulations shall be determined as invalid or void for any reason, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision of the bylaws or rules and regulations.

Section 2 - REQUIRED VOTE

Rules and regulations may be amended by a majority vote of the eligible members present and voting at any meeting.
